



3 TIME-SAVING THANKSGIVING TIPS

1. Clean out your freezer & prepare any dishes that can be frozen beforehand.

Prepare – pie crusts, rolls, homemade stock and freeze now to save you time closer to the big day. Cleanning out your freezer will give you plenty of room to store those items and also have room to freeze left-overs.

2. Allow Plenty of Time for Defrosting.

Make sure to thoroughly defrost your frozen turkey in the refrigerator. Waking up Thanksgiving morning to a frozen turkey isn't the best way to start the day and may cause you more work and stress! Always handle food safely to avoid any food poisoning mishaps!

3. Buy a Turkey That's Big Enough

Plan to serve ¾ to 1 pound of turkey per personthat wieght includes bones and other non-edible parts. If you want leftovers, use 1 to 1½ pounds per person.

Signs of a Four-Legged Freeloader

- Nesting materials: Mice will often build nests in your car. These nests can be made from a variety of materials, such as paper, fabric, and even your own hair

From fraudulent auction sales and gift cards to phishing and social networking scams, cyber schemes are everevolving and, unfortunately, still successful. - Purchase merchandise only from reputable sellers, and be suspicious of websites that do not provide contact information; also be wary if the seller only accepts wire transfers or cash.
- Do not respond to or click on links contained within unsolicited (spam) email.
- Be cautious of emails claiming to contain pictures in attached files; the files may contain viruses. Only open attachments from known senders. Scan the attachments for viruses if possible.
- Sign in directly to the official website for the business identified in the email instead of linking to it from an unsolicited email. If the email appears to be from your bank, credit card issuer or other company you deal with frequently, your statements or official correspondence from the business will provide the proper contact information.
- Contact the actual business that supposedly sent the email to verify that the email is genuine.
- If you are encouraged to act quickly or there is an emergency that requires your attention, it may be a scam. Fraudsters create a sense of urgency to get you to act quickly.
- REMEMBER—if it looks too good to be true...it probably is.

Look for generic batteries, not higher-cost brand names that do not preform any better. Do not buy pre-cut fruits and vegetables-they are not fresher or better quality than whole produce and won't last as long.




